

From the desk of the Immediate Past National President Col (Ret) M. J. Louw



Well, it is difficult to believe that at the SAAFA Congress 2024, I delivered my 6th and final Annual Report. The past six years have been somewhat of a rollercoaster ride, with many ups and downs, twists and turns, but thankfully, mostly soft landings.

Soon after my appointment, I had the privilege of witnessing the formal establishment of the Whale Coast Branch as an independent entity separate from the Cape Town Branch.

Unfortunately, I have also experienced a lack of growth and revival at some of our smaller Branches. And then along came Covid and the Lockdown months which really stymied our enthusiasm and dampened our spirits. Not to let this get us down, the Pretoria Branch, of which I am a member, resorted to online "Thirstday Gatherings" just to satisfy our need for camaraderie and social interaction, albeit in the confines of our own homes. On occasion, we had individuals from all over the country and indeed, even from Downunder and North America join in our online sessions. Military veterans are by nature social animals and it was obvious that we craved such interaction.

We are now four years down the line since the hard lockdown of 2020 was instituted and much has happened since then. The converse is, however, also true, in that in some instances not much has happened, with the blame for this being placed on Covid. Thankfully during 2023 several Branches showed strong revival, awakening from what can be termed as a slumber, and have started to reinstitute Branch activities to normalise things, if that is even possible.

Perhaps it is time to think outside of the box and to develop a new normal for ourselves, being creative and perhaps changing the way we did things in the past. Fundamentally though is that we continue to do things with the four pillars of the Association providing a sound basis, namely camaraderie, heritage/remembrance, benevolence and support to the SAAF and general aviation industry. We will need to identify and exploit all possible opportunities as they present themselves to grow and expand our sphere of influence. I do not doubt that we have within SAAFA, members with the calibre to rise to the occasion and to shape the way we need to do things going forward.

When the SAAF crafted its new vision and mission towards the end of 2021, it provided us with an opportunity to also craft for ourselves an updated vision and mission, although one that would remain true to our founding principles. Since the SAAF's slogan calls to "Free the Eagle", so it is that we as SAAFA should also seek ways and means of unleashing our inherent combined abilities to rise to the challenges of the current and future environment, and not merely to accept the mundane, blaming any inactivity on Covid. "Let's make SAAFA great again". It is now up to the new National President to decide to either remain with the current vision or to craft new horizons for our beloved Association.

One of the pillars upon which SAAFA is grounded is support to the SAAF and aviation in general. We all know the crippling effect that the ever-decreasing Defence Budget allocation has had over the years, to such an extent that capabilities have been eroded and continue to do so. Notwithstanding, the SAAF is putting in a sterling effort to do as much as they can with the little they receive. Yes, it is easy to make comparisons between the modern-day SAAF and the SAAF of our own younger days, but in this regard, context should not be ignored. The environment in which the SAAF was operating in our younger days differs vastly from the environment in which they are now operating. Resource allocation, particularly in terms of finances, has driven the SAAF to explore innovative ways of remaining afloat and to try to deliver on its mandate as best it can.

I do not think its' productive or helpful for persons to continually criticise the SAAF and in essence its members, on social media and other platforms, for this state of affairs. Rather, the SAAF and its members deserve our support and encouragement for performing near miracles with what little they have. The real SAAF is the bases, units and squadrons, and it is here in particular where the members deserve to be treated with respect and admiration for their efforts.

From our side, particularly at Branch level, we need to ensure that we remain on a good footing with Base and Unit Commanders by ensuring that there is very good communication and mutual respect.

It is my earnest wish, that during the years ahead, SAAFA will remain an Association that provides **Assistance** where required, is active in **Remembering** those who did not return, is able to **Support** our SAAF and aviation industry as and when required, and we will carry out these, our SAAFA objectives, whilst engaging in meaningful **Camaraderie**; enjoying one another's company, which is the platform on which all else is based.

Let us then continue to truly live out the values of our Association in being a source of comfort and strength to those most vulnerable among us, and to continue to maintain and foster friendship, comradeship, and good fellowship among all members. HERITAGE

During the past year, SAAFA was well represented at several Memorial Services held country-wide. Over the years we were fortunate that the sacredness of the Air Force Memorial at Bays Hill was rarely subject to any acts of vandalism and desecration. Unfortunately, this ended during November 2023, when the Memorial was indeed vandalised and parts of it desecrated.



As many of you might know, the Air Force Memorial is co-owned by the SAAFA and SAAF. Initially, it was thought that the site would not be ready in time to host the annual Air Force Memorial Service, but thankfully, due to the resolve of the Chief of the Air Force and his Command Cadre, the Service was held at Bays Hill this past Sunday. The unfortunate reality though, is that the Base just does not have the resources to ensure that the terrain is secured 24/7. Nonetheless, I have been assured that they are exploring all practical alternatives to secure this asset.

Renier Feldtmann continues to ensure that the national memorial events receive the appropriate treatment and support.

A fundamental of our heritage pillar is that of the preservation of our military aviation heritage. To this end our three Gauteng Branches have partnered with the Ditsong SA National Museum of Military History in Saxonwold, to partake in the general upkeep and maintenance of the air assets on display. FINANCES

In terms of our finances, we continue to live within our means, which will ensure that our Association will have a long financial horizon. This will only be possible by sticking strictly to our approved budget and cutting unnecessary costs. Cost saving remains the name of the game and the National Secretary, together with our



National Treasurer, are doing a sterling job at ensuring that we spend within our means and budget. Our investment at Sanlam Private Wealth continued to provide us with reasonable returns despite the volatile market conditions.

and expenditure, this was mainly due to the fact that we did not receive our annual Wilmot Trust Bequest of over R122 000, we also had additional Congress expenditure, as well as increased financial support towards the Curamus.

Although we ended the year with a net loss of R210 800 in terms of our income

Additionally, we did not make use of the budgeted drawdown of R50 000 from our SPW investment which also impacted upon the increased deficit. Nonetheless, the statement of financial position clearly illustrates the healthy state of our Association, with assets being represented in the main by our investment in Sanlam Private Wealth, which has increased in value from R1 738 989 to R2 012 994 (almost 15.75%).

In terms of Funds and reserves, we commenced 2023 with R2 239 238 and ended 2023 with R2 286 929 funds under administration. The General Fund stood at R1 021 716 at the end of 2022 and now reflects a balance of R1 013 368 at the end of 2023 (down by 0.8%).

BENEVOLENCE



The ongoing efforts by Branches to support the needy are greatly appreciated. My appreciation goes to Trevor Slade for his commitment to improving the lot of those less fortunate and he has ensured that from the National level, we are able to assist in terms of the annual bonuses.

By the end of 2023, six Branches had supported eleven Beneficiaries and funds expended towards their welfare totalled just R178 740, including NEC Christmas Bonuses. With grants to other benevolent causes, total benevolence payments of just under R200 000 were made for the year.

On this note, it must be reiterated that Branches are to ensure that every Branch Beneficiary is assessed at least on an annual basis and even more often where necessary. However, our Beneficiaries should not be seen as a burden, but as an opportunity to celebrate one of our main reasons for existence through the pillar of Benevolence. We encourage those Branches with no Beneficiaries to please consider giving support to their local Air Force Base should there be one, or indeed to local Charities, particularly Hospices that provide support to ailing ex-servicemen and women.

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

We continue to have very good relations with individual veteran organisations and the Council of Military Veteran Organisations (CMVO).

Finally, we can report the enactment of the long outstanding military veteran legislation which regulates the payment of veteran pensions. However, we are still faced with the challenge of having to deal with a dysfunctional Department of Military Veterans. Once again I need to reiterate that it is vitally important for every member of SAAFA to be registered on the database of the Department of Military Veterans. The benefits are considerable and we encourage every Branch to launch a campaign to register their members with the DMV.



My thanks and appreciation are extended to Colin Bowring for carrying the mantle of veteran affairs. Colin obviously has a passion for the plight of military veterans as he is also the local Chairperson of SAMVOZA. He was also recently co-opted onto the Board of Directors of the National War Fund.

MEDICAL

Our National Medical Liaison Officer, Bill de Pinho, endeavours to maintain cordial relations with the Regular Force Medical Continuation Fund as well as the South African Military Health Services. Although the rollout of the Schedule of Benefits initially caused much consternation, much of it was due to ignorance and a lack of understanding of the processes.



The RFMF has tried to counter this through the hosting of information sessions, online roadshows and links sent out for one-on-one discussion. Despite the initial negative sentiment, there are many positives in the new system and this will be elucidated upon by Bill de Pinho later on. Information sessions have been arranged by The Fund, and links sent out for one-on-one discussion, including how to manage the way any procedures should be followed, who to report to, and other specific information relating to the SoB.

A vital aspect though is that of communication. Beneficiaries of the RFMCF are encouraged to download and register on the applicable App to remain abreast of affairs and to source authorities for medical services required. I would like to express my thanks and appreciation to the Chairpersons and/or Medical Liaison Officers of those outlying Branches who are doing sterling work in assisting particularly the elderly veterans to access medical assistance as and when required.

CONSTITUTION, REGULATIONS AND RECORDS



At the 78th Annual General Meeting of the SAAF Association held in May 2023, no resolutions to change the SAAFA Constitution were passed, therefore the constitution of May 2022 is still the latest version.

With respect to the Manual of Administration, NEC has approved a change relating to Chapter 10, Preparing for the Final Day. The updated version is now available.

I extend my thanks and appreciation to Hugh Paine for the relentless manner in which he perseveres to ensure that our Constitution, Manual of Administration and Records remain up-to-date and relevant.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership has always been an ongoing task with new ways and means of getting information to update the membership database of each Branch being developed. This in itself brings about its own challenges.

Although our membership status has remained rather stable, there are a few Branches that are showing remarkable signs of growth. The Benevolence Portfolio of the NEC begins by complimenting and thanking our Comrades, Chair Couple Marius and Mariska van Wyk, Committee Members and supporters, Stevan, Errol and Sandra, Cathy, Lorette, Benny, Hartog and others of SAAFA Outeniqua for this year hosting, so well, our 79th Annual General Meeting in this beautiful part of our country. Marius, you and your Team are deeply appreciated for your very hard work in making this Congress successful and enjoyable for all of us. We thank you!

The general hangover and lethargy caused by COVID-19 is OVER and it is evident that SAAFA's resilience and dedication to the ideals of our proud Association, and the care and well-being of our Beneficiaries and Members are vibrant, and in many cases most inspiring! I know of Branches who organise fun Outings for their Members AND Beneficiaries...Christmas Parties for needy children and Senior Citizens...who Donate funding to struggling SAAFA Branches...who provide medication and health aids to Members in need...The list goes on and is impressive.

But so much more must be done to continue giving credence to the veracity of SAAFA Benevolence. It importantly concerns every one of us in caring for our Members.

In the April edition of the "Flying Spirit" I quoted from John Maxwell's book, "The Four Pillars of Leadership", where he says that "People don't care how much you know... until they know how much you care". Our Branches and all of SAAFA care for our Members and this Portfolio appreciates and thanks every Branch and Member for your focus on this very important founding Pillar of the South African Air Force Association. May you continue in strength and enjoyment.

There are two important Benevolence additions to our SAAFA Manual of Administration which have been included in Chapter 10..." Preparing for the Final Day".

I feature them here for our information:

*DEMENTIA.

It is an unfortunate fact of life that some elderly people (one in ten over the age of 65) develop dementia to varying degrees of severity. The traumatic social impact of this illness will always be severe. However, where the spouse, afflicted with dementia, is in **sole control** of the family's Accounts, Assets and Properties it could/will be economically devastating for the family and financial hardship is very likely to be suffered if appropriate action is not taken. The following steps can substantially reduce the impact of such a situation:

- * While a couple is healthy, and before any dementia is diagnosed, they can **together** visit their Bank/s and obtain the Banks Power of Attorney giving each spouse access to the other's Bank accounts, if and when necessary. Such authorities are not without risks and need to be discussed in detail with the Bank official. Downloaded "self-help" Power of Attorney forms are of no benefit for banking matters.
- * Before, or especially during the early stages of the onset of the disease, an attorney needs to be approached, particularly where the Property is concerned, to draw up a suitable Power of Attorney which sets out specific conditions and scope of the powers. It is generally required that **two** doctors provide the attorney with written reports on the individual's diagnosis.

It is preferable that the document be formally registered to avoid legal ramifications later if other family members disagree with actions taken by the remaining partner.

*LIFE FILES.

With the sad passing of a loved one, many families and Executors of Estates have experienced great difficulty in accessing important information regarding the deceased. While we are **alive** we need to ease that burden on our family and executors by providing as much comprehensive information as possible. For example, in this electronic era, the safe retention of Banking, Tax and other passwords on your devices is vital. The detailed safekeeping of these passwords and important legal documents is not only a reminder of your current living status, but your Life File will also advise your family of your wishes when you die. Many financial advisors have developed comprehensive Life File documents which would help people record this data.

A Life File prepared by Mark Wenzel of Efficient Wealth is available from SAAFA NHQ. Remember to keep your Life File in a safe place so that the information is not misused and let your next of kin know where it is!

SAAFA BRANCH BENEFICIARIES.

Those Branches supporting Beneficiaries in 2023 and 2024 reported as follows: WHALE COAST. Paid ONE Beneficiary...R1920 in 2023. They have NO Beneficiaries in 2024. PORT ALFRED. Paid TWO Beneficiaries R38 100 in 2023 and will pay ONE Beneficiary R7 200 in 2024. CAPE TOWN. TWO Beneficiaries were paid a total of R52 000 in 2023. The Branch will be paying ONE Beneficiary R36 000 in 2024. PRETORIA. TWO Beneficiaries were paid R26 520 in 2023 and ONE Beneficiary will be paid R17 640 in 2024. (A Budget of R18 000 has been provided for the possibility of a further Beneficiary). STILFONTEIN. TWO Beneficiaries were paid R13 200 in 2023 and TWO will be paid R13 200 in 2024. DURBAN. TWO Beneficiaries were paid R38 934 in 2023 and TWO will be paid R40 881 in 2024. All other Branches report NO formal Beneficiaries in their care.

IN CONCLUSION, SIX Branches supported ELEVEN Beneficiaries paying R170 674 in 2023. It is envisaged that FIVE Branches will be supporting SEVEN Beneficiaries paying R114 921 in 2024.

The NEC paid a December 2023 Christmas bonus of R2 750 to EIGHT Beneficiaries...A Total of R22 000...Plus R25 000 to other receivers of Benevolence. An NEC Total of R47 000 in 2023.

In conclusion, a Total SAAFA BENEVOLENCE FIGURE of R217 674 was PAID in 2023.

Well done to our Branches, our Members, our families and our NEC; all of whom give their Effort, Time, Gifts and Talents to the Growth of the South African Air Force Association and the Benevolent well-being of our Members and others in need.


His strategic planning interventions (dozens) include the following:

SAAFA CONGRESS 2024 – FAIRY KNOWE HOTEL 23 May – 26 May 2024

In 2022 the SAAFA Outeniqua Branch was aware that Congress 2024 would be held in the garden route. I presented our plan at the Port Elizabeth Congress in 2023. We planned to hold Congress at the Fairy Knowe Hotel over the set dates in 2024.

From the onset, the national elections in 2024 were a great concern as we estimated that there is a great possibility that voting will take place over the dates of Congress. As the voting date is set by the president 90 days before voting this was quite a challenge if not a bit of a gamble.

By December 2024 we had a rough idea of what we wanted to present. But still the voting date was not set. This worked exceptionally well as each committee then concentrated on what was agreed upon in the initial meeting, without having too many people together to change ideas and directions of thinking. This made the planning in a short time very easy.

In March the invitations went out and all was booked with the option of postponing at short notice due to the elections. By the end of March all branches responded and paid for the delegates attending Congress. The only exception was Chief of the Air Force and his delegates which only responded a week before the start of Congress.

By the 15th of April the Fees committee had all the decor made, booked and arranged. Laurétt and Mariska even worked in a two-week vacation to the UK between the 15th April and Congress. Cathy and Sandra made all the sweets and feather decorations which was all ready in time.

As operational committee Stephan, myself and Mariska got together once or twice otherwise, we had a quick zoom meeting to double check Stephan's Well-presented spreadsheets with all details and statistics required planning such an event. The expected cost for the delegates attending was approximately R 1000 lower than presented at Congress 2023 in Port Elizabeth, which came as a big relief for me as it becomes ever increasingly more difficult to present such an event at a reasonable cost. My two number crunchers Stephan and Mariska put my restless mind at ease that financially I had no concerns.

As I arrived fully loaded with all the decor and Congress paraphernalia at the Fairy Knowe Hotel on the 23rd of May, I was completely at ease and could not believe how easily everything fell into place so well. I did not have to check up on anybody that was tasked to do something for Congress. If a task was given it was done with complete enthusiasm and success.

Transport was done by Hartog Blok, Laurétt and Mariska for the delegates arriving at the airport. This gave an added personal touch to arriving at Congress. The delegates arriving on their own were met by myself and Stephan. All delegates were taken directly to their rooms where they welcome packs awaited them. Many of the delegates complimented us on the way that the arrival at the hotel was handled. There was no unnecessary queuing at the reception area waiting to be taken to your room, as you arrived someone took you directly to your room to unpack and relax.

Various awards and appointments were handed out during the evening of which the award of Branch of the Year is a new award that was handed to the Whale Coast Branch. The venue was beautifully decorated and set the mood for a relaxing evening of camaraderie. After dinner, the delegates enjoyed some more dancing in the spirit of the previous evening. The evening was concluded with more laughter and back-slapping in the pub, and everyone had the feeling that Congress was just too short.


